Approval of Minutes: The minutes of the meeting of December 9, 2008, were approved as distributed.





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

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Board of Trustees authorized the issuance of University Funding Obligations, Series of 2009, and a subsequent refunding issue during the next twelve months, in an amount not to exceed \$125,000,000, and adopted the Resolution set forth in Agenda Reference 2.

3. Declaration Regarding Reimbursement of Capital Through Debt Financing
